**Small Acreage Owners Learn Ways to Boost Benefits of Rural Lifestyle**  
**Inaugural Iowa Small Farms Conference to be held Feb. 13**

Small farm and acreage owners are invited to attend the inaugural Iowa Small Farms Conference, scheduled for Feb. 13, 2016 in Ames, Iowa. Keynote speaker Daniel Salatin of Polyface Farms will be featured along with a trade show, lunch and giveaways.

“The Iowa Small Farms Conference will be a great event for people who are excited to learn more about opportunities on their small farm or acreage,” said Christa Hartsook, small farms program coordinator at Iowa State University Extension and Outreach. “With a wide variety of educational options, attendees can get the most out of their day by customizing the conference to fit their specific needs and interests.”

The day will begin with an address from keynote speaker Daniel Salatin, a third generation farmer on Polyface Farms in Swoope, Virginia. Polyface Farms produces meat and produce for families, retail outlets and restaurants. Salatin has been involved in the farm since he was young and is now fully employed by the farm.

Five different educational sessions will be led by experts and offer a wide variety of information to attendees. Options will include orchard establishment, the Iowa Monarch Conservation Consortium, raising ancient grains, small-scale machinery sharing, taking your recipe to market and more.

A trade show at the conference will provide attendees with opportunities to network with companies. Prizes and giveaways will be featured at the end of the day, along with an ice cream social.
